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CYBERBULLYING

What does it really mean?

Cyberbullying occurs when a child or teenager receives from someone anonymously or by name, threats or is harassed, humiliated, usually in a repetitive way, via the internet (social networks, games, applications etc.) or mobile phones.

In other words...

Any action on the internet is intended to drive a child to despair and to causing him fear on a systematic basis can be considered cyberbullying.

How exactly can cyberbullying be expressed?

The forms that cyberbullying can take are varied and can include: sending messages with harmful and threatening content, sending or posting sensitive information such as sexual preferences, posting personal photos on blogs and social networks, creating a fake profile on social networks with the purpose of making fun of a child, creating a group on internet and/or voting with the purpose of humiliating the child (for example, what is the ugliest child in the class), etc.

VIOLATION OF PRIVACY

When we refer to privacy on the Internet, we mean the ability that some companies have to monitor the websites we visit. At every step of our journey on the Internet we "offer" personal information. This information is like a puzzle that must be completed to reveal our identity.

Privacy is not synonymous with security as concepts. A database with personal information can be designed as securely as required, but that does not mean that it cannot violate the privacy of the people whose information is there.



VIOLATION OF PRIVACY

By processing this data they can understand our gender, age, our personal preferences, the books, movies and music we like, our eating habits, the places we go on vacation, pretty much everything we are interested in and search through the computer.



The data collected has enormous commercial value. With proper processing, advertisers can show us targeted ads that are more likely to interest us and motivate us to make a purchase.

Invasion of privacy is the unwarranted intrusion into the personal life of another without consent.





It is no coincidence that if we visit an online store, for example with clothes, we will often come across advertisements for the same store or for its individual products on other, unrelated sites.
