



Castro del Río is a town in the province of Córdoba (Andalucía). It is situated in the southeast of Spain.

Nochevieja, is the term used for New Year's Eve in Spain. Just before the clock hits midnight, we eat 12 green grapes, one for every strike of the clock. If you manage to eat the twelve grapes in the 12 strikes before midnight, you are guaranteed good fortune for the New Year.

They are "The Three Kings or the Three Wise Men" (known as Reyes Magos – Melchior, Gaspar and Baltazar) who bring the gifts to good children at Christmas time. We leave out our shoes for the Kings to fill with gifts during the night. They come 6<sup>th</sup> January.



Christmas cake is one of the favourite Spanish Christmas foods, but in Spain, they don't enjoy it until Epiphany on January 6th, to celebrate the arrival of the Three Wise Men in Bethlehem. On this holy day, they bake the Roscón de Reyes, a sweet bread-like cake, filled with whipped cream and topped with candied fruits and crushed almonds.
