It was built in the 2nd century AD by the Romans. This house was built next to the river Thames. It had five parts: the courtyard, the east wing, the north wing, the west wing and the bathhouse. The bathhouse was built in the 3rd century AD and it comprised of a frigidarium {cold room}, a tepidarium {warm room} and a caldarium {hot room}. It was found in 1848.


Now you can visit it in 101 Lower Thames Street. The house is open every Saturday from April to November.
