### The Diseases

### Similarities

All three events involved devastating pandemics or plagues that caused significant death tolls.

### Differences

Athens faced an unidentified plague (possibly typhoid)
London dealt with the bubonic plague
Chalkida faced COVID-19

### Causes of the Disease

### Similarities

All were caused by infectious agents and spread rapidly due to population density and human contact.

### Differences

Athens: Spread during war

London: Spread by fleas on rats

Chalkida: Spread globally via respiratory transmission and

travel

# Measures Taken by Authorities

### Similarities

Limited understanding led to reliance on available knowledge, including isolation and local remedies.

### Differences

Athens: Religious rituals

London: Quarantines and burning fires

Chalkida: Modern science-based measures like lockdowns and

vaccines

### What Families Did

### Similarities

Families tried to protect themselves and care for their sick members, often staying indoors or fleeing crowded areas.

### Differences

Athens: Crowded living conditions left little room for escape

London: Wealthy families fled to the countryside

Chalkida: Families stayed home during lockdowns

# How Teenagers Spent Their Time

### Similarities

Teenagers helped their families in all time periods and found ways to pass the time indoors or isolated.

#### Differences

Athens: Religious and household tasks

London: Reading and simple games

Chalkida: Online schooling, video games, and social media

## What Changed in People's Lives

### Similarities

All events caused disruption, fear, and long-term changes to daily life.

#### Differences

Athens: Political and social decline

London: Population loss and economic shifts

Chalkida: Mental health challenges and economic uncertainty

# Political, Social, and Religious Consequences

### Similarities

Faith in leadership and institutions was tested in all cases.

#### Differences

Athens: Decline in trust in gods and chaos

London: Religious devotion increased

Chalkida: Polarization over health measures and vaccines
