

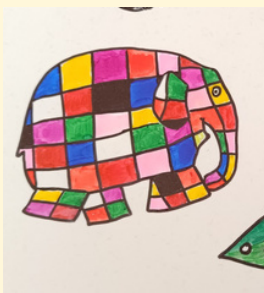
Storytelling chair heroes

Dear Zoo by David McKee

A little boy wants a pet, but the zoo keeps sending him animals (revealed behind flaps) that just won't make good pets. (suitable for teaching wild animals / fair treatment to animals)



Elmer by David McKee

Elmer the Patchwork Elephant (often shortened to Elmer) is one of the most iconic and widely read children's book series of all time! (suitable for teaching colours / acceptance, respect)



The Very Hungry Caterpillar by Eric Carle

A picture book about the life of a young, hungry caterpillar who is in search of food to eat to turn him into a beautiful butterfly, eating his way through the pages! (suitable for teaching food / the days of the week.)



The tiger who came to tea by Judith Kerr

An entertaining story about a tiger who acts most decidedly improper at tea time eating everything up! (suitable for teaching British tea culture / manners)



We're going on a bear hunt by Michael Rosen

A family embark on an exciting adventure to find a bear. On their journey, the family encounter many different terrains! (suitable for teaching hibernating animals / prepositions / noises)



Lucy the Mermaid and the Easter Egg Hunt by Isla Wynter

A really cute story about mermaids and other sea creatures as they search for chocolate Easter eggs under the waves. (suitable for Easter / sea creatures)



Where's Spot? by Eric Hill

In Eric Hill's first ever lift-the-flap tale a mother dog is searching for her lost puppy (Spot) and as she roams around the house she finds eight other animals before she finds Spot. (suitable for teaching animals / spatial concepts (under, behind, in))



Mog and me by Judith Kerr

Mog and Nicky have a busy day full of fun, from waking up with a big stretch to falling asleep together. (suitable for teaching daily routines / pets-cats)

Rosie's walk

Although unaware that a fox is after her as she takes a walk around the farmyard, Rosie the hen still manages to lead him into one accident after another. (suitable for teaching prepositions / farm)

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Shark in the Park! by Nick Sharratt

Timothy Pope has a brand new telescope and he's testing it out at the park! A delightful, entertaining story – with its rhyming text and ingenious die-cut pages (suitable for teaching prepositions / right-left / There is - There are)



Room on the Broom by Julia Donaldson

The witch and her cat are flying through the sky on their broomstick-until the witch drops her hat, then her bow, then her wand! (suitable for teaching values such as friendship / teamwork / helping others)



The Gruffalo by Julia Donaldson

The story of a clever mouse taking a walk in the woods and deceiving different predators, including the Gruffalo! (suitable for teaching body parts / colours / animals)



Paddington by Michael Bond

The story of how Paddington arrived in London and met his warm, loving family, The Browns! (suitable for teaching British culture / reading maps)



Where the Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak

When Max's anger gets the better of him and he is sent to bed without supper, he turns to his imagination and creates fantastical "wild things" as his company! (suitable for teaching about fantasy/ misbehaviour and punishment)



Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes by James Dean

Pete the Cat is a cool cat that loves his bright white sneakers so much that he sings about them wherever he goes, despite his misfortunes. (suitable for teaching colours / positive attitude)



Rapunzel by the Grimm Brothers

Rapunzel is the famous fairy tale that tells the story of a young woman with incredibly long hair locked away in a tower by a wicked sorceress.. (suitable for teaching the value of not giving up hope)



The Cat in the Hat by Dr Seuss

This is an iconic book about a cat which visits two children, Sally and Sam, who are home alone and having a very dull day. The cat and his companions, Thing One and Thing Two, eventually wreck the house. (suitable for older kids)



Jack (or Jim) and the Beanstalk by Raymond Briggs

Jack, a poor country boy, trades the family cow for a handful of magic beans, which grow into a massive, towering beanstalk reaching up into the clouds. In the other version Jim helps the old Giant get new things for himself and makes friends with the Giant. (suitable for teaching the value of making the best of a bad situation / overcoming challenges)
